

Woodside High School's varsity football team is off to a shaky start this without winning a game until the September 28th game. Is there a possible solution to turning the season around?





Unless you're a student in the art department, it's never required to submit a piece. Students who are in the art department, however, are required to submit a piece as a major project grade.



Student IDs and Faces Are No Longer Enough for Woodside High School?

Do YOU have a T-Pass? Looks like you'll need one as all students are now required to have it with them at all times throughout the school day.


These small cards of plastic have become a huge part of the daily school routine and have become a necessity. During the 22-23 school year, the district began to issue out "T-Passes" which have a student's full name, picture, and a barcode that can be scanned for multiple things during the school day. The student is encouraged to keep it on them at all times including during the school day. This pass allows you to check out when getting school lunch, check out library books, and most importantly, board the bus in the afternoon.

These "T-Passes" are unnecessary for a multitude of reasons, especially for high schoolers! In the afternoons, students have to scan their T-Passes in order to get on the bus, and if you don't have it guess what happens!... You cannot get on the bus! It's crazy to think that you will be denied a ride home from school without this card, which shows the same face that the bus drivers already see in person every day. As 14-18-year-olds, we know where we need to go after school as far as getting home and it gets to a point where bus drivers even know who rides the bus they drive and who doesn't, they also have a list of the names of the students that are supposed to be on that bus. I personally believe that it's ridiculous to add a restriction to something as necessary as student transportation from school.

As I mentioned earlier, T-Passes are also used for library and lunch checkouts because, for some reason, lunch numbers aren't enough anymore. Student ID numbers have been used for both these things for as long as any student can remember, and have worked perfectly fine since then. For checking out in these two places, it's now used as a backup option to put in your lunch number if you've lost your T-Pass, unlike the bus situation. If they're going to allow students to put in their lunch numbers anyway, it makes more sense to just not require the T-passes for checking out of the lunch line or the library.

I've interviewed a fellow classmate of mine, such as junior Griffin Watson, to get some other feedback about T-Passes. I asked her "What do you think are the negative effects of T-Passes" to which she responded, "...It really doesn't help if not everyone has it." I was glad to hear that I wasn't the only one with this mindset towards them and that others recognize that they are not helpful if many don't have theirs daily for various reasons.

I think that a system where both could be used freely would be a much better option, n longer would students have to stress if someone has lost or forgotten their T-Pass. The idea of T-Passes was cool, but they've become more of an inconvenience to students and faculty than a help.



Are Metal Detectors Needed?

The clear book bags help the security guard to identify a threat before something happens." Overall, there were a lot of mixed feelings about the metal detectors and clear book bags this school year.

I asked several teachers how they felt about the metal detectors and the clear book bags and this is what they had to say. "It's a good idea to have clear bookbags and metal detectors. It's a good idea, because knowing that we have metal detectors makes me feel safer at school, and having the clear book bags is a good thing because I can see the things that are in the bookbags to see if they have anything that they are not supposed to have," said Mr. Smith.

"I feel like the metal detectors were a good thing that we needed. I felt safer and all the students I talked to said they felt safer too. I feel the clear book bag discourages the students from bringing things that shouldn't be in school. But, I feel the students don't have any privacy with the clear book bags. With the clear book bags, it's hard to figure out who they belong to now because they all look the same." pointed out Coach Carr.

"I like the metal detectors and the clear book bags. It doesn't seem to slow down the arrival. Having additional security is never a bad thing. If you need a clear bookbag and metal detector to enter a concert, why should we have anything less for a school?" stated Mrs. Heath. So even the teachers all have different opinions on the metal detectors and clear book bags.

Do I feel that we need clear book bags and metal detectors at the same time? No, I don't. I feel as though it is a waste of time and money to have both. There should be a better way to enforce safety in the school for the sake of the students (like myself) and others in the school building.



Some students I have seen get away with being out of dress code, and no one was distracted in the classroom. I agree that the dress code should be less strict on students."

Students should be allowed to wear crop tops, shorts that are short but cover their private areas, etc. We understand that some of the rules are for safety reasons such as not representing gangs or drugs on clothes. Even the rules about hoodies and hats on so if something happens it is easier to identify people makes sense.

Newly Naked, What Happens Now?

A new Newport News Public Schools mandate has caused a divisive split among staff and students alike. Students may no longer use standard backpacks, instead, they must use division-issued clear backpacks, On one hand, some think it's the best thing for safety, but on the other hand, some think it's just another rule they have to follow. Learning the perspectives of the four different sides affected by this (teachers, officers, administrators and students) will help tell us exactly where things stand.

While doing this article I have interviewed all the different sides of this and I have realized my opinion has not changed. I went around and interviewed people with the same or similar questions, which were; Has this new policy made you feel safer? Do you think the new policy has stopped the illegal activity happening in the school? If you could, would you go back to the regular backpacks or stay with the clear ones? And what is your opinion overall about this policy? While going through this article I will put my own opinion last while adding the different answers to the questions.

Before we go into the interviews and my own opinion of this policy, it is important to first understand why this policy was put in place and what the intended purpose was when this idea came to fruition. This policy was originally thought of back in the 1990s as a way of security after school shootings and terrorist attacks. While this new policy has only recently been admitted into the Newport News schools it has long since been a daily part of multiple schools in Florida since 2018 and much like how the response to them differs here it was the exact same way there.

Another important thing to go over is why these backpacks were even implemented in the first place. Woodside High School, as far as I can tell, has never had a school shooting but in the last three years there have been multiple threats, there have been students who brought a gun to school, and there have been many students and parents who were too afraid to go to/send kids to school, a place that should always be a safe haven. This argument goes back and forth so much simply because it is the result of such a deeper issue in our community and our country.

On this topic I decided to interview people who were directly affected by this new policy and for the questions provided earlier, these were their responses.

When asked the question: 'Does this policy make you feel safer than you did before?'

Officer Washington had this to say "Yes, the only complaint I have is that the bookbags keep getting ripped!".

Mrs.Heath's response to the question was, "I always felt safe, but it is nice to know there are added levels of security, it doesn't change anything about my job but I wish teachers got one too."

When student Jordan Harris was asked this question, she said "No. Just cause we can see through your bag doesn't mean we can see through your intentions".

Finally, when Assistant Principle Dr.Davidson was asked, she said, "Being safe was never a concern of mine because I have always been confident in the security and resource officers that we have at this school".

Personally, I have always felt safe and protected, whether it's from my teachers who remain calm and level with us about the situation, or from the officers who are always making sure that things are going smoothly.

The next question asked was: 'Do you think that this policy has stopped illegal activity that was in the school? And if not, do you think it has worsened or gotten better?'

Officer Washington said his perspective was, "I think it has gotten better, because they can't hide things in them".

Next, I asked Mrs. Heath who had an opinion that I greatly agree with, "I think if you want something badly enough then you will do it regardless. But I think that it is discouraging kids to bring things they are not supposed to, such as vapes and all that jazz."

When Jordan gave her answer she said, "No, I don't think it has worsened, but it certainly hasn't gotten better."

Lastly when Dr.Davidson was asked she responded, "I will put it this way, At Woodside we didn't really have a lot of what people would consider illegal activity I don't see that, I think it goes back to my earlier statement people who wish to do harm are the only ones affected, but I think it gives comfort to students who can see what in others bookbags, so there's not a lot of mystery or anxiety for those students."

While I agree with Mrs.Heath simply because this has been proven time and time again I don't agree with Dr.Davidson because I personally have never been worried about what's in someone's backpack, but have been concerned about what a kid might have on their physical person.

Another question asked was: "If you could have it your way would you go back to the regular bags or would you keep the clear ones and why?"

Officer Washington's views were, "Keep the clear ones, because from a safety standpoint, we can see what's in it and kids won't put weapons in them were as the old ones kids could put anything in them."

As Mrs.Heath said in her response, which I agree with, "I would keep the clear ones but I wish they would be more heavy duty."

When Jordan was asked she said, "I would go back to the regular bookbags because why would you have ugly clear book bags that are ineffective when you could have cute regular book bags that are ineffective?".

Finally when Dr.Davidson was asked, "I would keep the clear ones cause for one the clear ones are cleaner, you don't run the risk of picking others germs up from other people's homes and we are still in a COVID world".

I want to go back to the old backpacks simply because they were not only sturdier but safer in regards to kids who walk home or walk from the bus stop. People are sick in the world and it is not such a hard thing to imagine happening.

The final question asked was: What is your opinion on the policy as a whole? Officer Washington's final response was "I think it's a good policy, I know when you go out to sporting events you need them, so it's good to see in schools as well."

Mrs.Heath's response was, "I think the bags are helpful for more than security."

When Jordan answered her response was, "I feel like they used it as an extra step in our security, but I feel like in some ways it's unnecessary."

And finally, when Dr.Davidson was asked she said, "I think the clear backpack policy as a whole is very positive on many fronts, and like any other policy it will work as long as people comply. Overall I think the policy overall works very nicely."

In my honest opinion, I believe that this policy is a bandaid. It helps to make a patchwork solution to a problem that has been going on for decades. Clear backpacks don't make me feel safer outside or inside of school, they don't make my day any easier because of how flimsy they are, they don't stop people from bringing illegal things into the school or stop them from doing illegal things in the school, and most importantly it doesn't stop me from fearing the next person who might or might not do something irreparable.

Yet with that being said, it would be unfair if I didn't flip the coin and say what it does. For everything that the clear backpacks don't do, they do make it that much harder to smuggle something into the school, they do make it a lot easier to search bags in those situations where you don't know who has a gun but you know that someone does, it does make not forgetting your binder/folder easier, and finally, it does give a semblance (however small) of peace.
